Call to Order

Srinath Ekkad called the meeting to order at 12:00 p.m. The minutes were approved electronically. As an overview to the committee, it was noted that faculty can request IP back if VTIP would not be pursuing the IP. A form has been created that will address the process by which an inventor can request rights to IP back from VTIP. VTIP would sign the form, then a designated signature from the Vice President for Research and Innovation office, and then the inventor. After the signatures are accepted, then it would then go back to the inventor. If there are issues with the IP and VTIP does not think the IP is a good idea, then it would come to the IPC for discussion. A question was raised about the departmental signature. The form will be forwarded to Kim O'Rourke for her input.

Crowdfunding

Srinath shared articles on crowdfunding and how other universities are using crowdfunding. Some examples are crowdfunding scholarships, especially with alumni. Some of the small liberal arts schools are crowdfunding research projects. Student run projects and senior design projects are crowdfunded. Leadership in university development believes it does have some value, and it can be looked into. The question now that needs to be addressed at this time would be is if we need a policy on crowdfunding. There are IP issues is some cases. Other universities are exploring this, and some independent organizations are helping universities for accessing crowdfunding. There is potential for crowdfunding through ICAT.

As an example, other institutions have created another mechanism for dealing with crowdfunding. It is a separate office, and not through sponsored programs. The money is considered a donation. There are some unique opportunities on campuses for projects that are non-traditional which have aspects of education, new technology, research aspects to it, and a social aspect. A policy is set up on how the money is used, and what is developed out of that money.

University Development and Virginia Tech Foundation will be invited to attend a future meeting to discuss crowdfunding.
